2017 Florida Triple Crown Bus Roadeo

On April 28 and 29, Florida's best bus drivers and technicians participated in the 2017 Florida Triple Crown Bus Roadeo in Daytona Beach, Florida and hosted by VOTRAN. The 2017 Florida Triple Crown Roadeo once again combined the FPTA and RTAP roadeos into a single, colossal weekend honoring all of Florida's maintenance technicians, paratransit and fixed route operators. Over 300 competitors, judges, sponsors, guests and dignitaries participated in the two day event.

The year's event was a joint effort of FPTA, the Florida RTAP, FDOT, and the Florida Association of Coordinated Transit Systems.

The 2017 Roadeo offered three unique firsts: the first combined bus roadeo to be held indoors, the first state roadeo to use electronic scoring, and the first roadeo nationally with competition for paratransit maintenance technicians.

There were training opportunities for the participants. Then the bus operator participant's skills were tested with a written test and the on-course competition. The maintenance technicians faced similar challenges with a written test and a series of diagnostic tests.

As always, the event concluded with an Awards Banquet that crowned and recognized the 2017 champions in the paratransit van and cutaway divisions, the fixed route bus division, the individual paratransit maintenance technician, and the maintenance technician's team competition.

Damian Woodard from Ride Right took the top honors in the inaugural paratransit maintenance technician competition, outpacing his fellow paratransit technicians.

Calhoun County Transit's Michael Wimberly drove away with the Van Category Championship, with Lee Tran's Chris Cowles being designated as the Cutaway Category Champion. Both will travel to Detroit, Michigan in early June to represent Florida at the Community Transportation Association of America (CTAA) national roadeo.

Years Working with Current Agency: 9 years

Years Working in Transit Industry: 9 years – still a rookie.

Biggest Surprise Working in Paratransit: How many people depend on transportation services for access to medical appointments and other life sustaining needs. If you don't personally need this type of service or provide this type of service, you don't realize the significant impact this service has on the lives of many individuals.

Biggest Challenge Working in Paratransit: Funding. Understanding all of the different funding streams and their requirements and/or limitations.

Transportation is not an easy field to step into. It takes many years of working in the middle of everything to really understand how challenging and rewarding this job is – whether on the operational side or the funding side. Right when you think you have it all figured out, you learn something new.

Personal Benefit Working in Paratransit: Knowing that what we do makes a true difference in the daily lives of others. Transportation is key to being independent. It provides an opportunity for individuals who cannot drive to medical appointments, shopping, work, etc, without having to always depend on family members or friends. To be able to help someone maintain their independence so that they can feel good about themselves is the icing on the cake.

START Train-the-Trainer Scheduled for St. Johns County – November 2017

The Florida Department of Transportation's Florida Rural Transit Assistance Program (RTAP), administered by the Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR) will present the two-day National RTAP's START (Safety Training and Rural Transit) Train-the-Trainer Workshop, November 6-7, 2017 at Emergency Operations Center facility in St. Johns County, Florida.

The provision of transit services in a safe, secure, and customer-oriented manner demands that bus and van operators (drivers) are well trained and knowledgeable about the equipment they operate, the conditions under which they drive, and the passengers they serve. The National RTAP developed START course guidebook as a training tool to help guide operators in these three very important areas of knowledge and skill. This course provided a guide for

trainers on how to effectively use the START materials when training transit drivers.

The START program has been designed to train new and veteran trainers and drivers in community transit safety and security. The three unit modules that were taught include: Vehicle Safety, Driver Safety, and Passenger Safety

Registration for this training opportunity will open in mid-summer.
